## LIFE (Learning In Faith Experiences)

In today's Gospel we hear Jesus using metaphors of salt and light describing the life of discipleship, following up the teaching of the

Beatitudes from last week. We take salt and light for granted in our society, but these commodities were more precious in Jesus' day and age. Salt "in the olden days" was used as a commodity for trading, like we trade gold and stock today. Salt was also used for flavoring, and very importantly - as a preservative, keeping food from going bad. Just like today still, salt enhanced and gave a rich flavor to food, and it also served as a healing agent. In today's Gospel Jesus tells us that WE are salt for the earth. What does that mean? We as people of faith are to be that special flavor, that unique ingredient that makes a dish/meal pop. I don't know about you, but sometimes I get a craving for something salty. Which, of course, leads me to wonder if/when people get "cravings" or urges for something salty – of the spiritual kind – how effective are we at being the salt for the earth ingredient to others? Do we "share bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and homeless, clothe the naked, not turn our backs" (from our Old Testament reading of Isaiah) and try to live out the Corporal Works of Mercy? Jesus also talks today about how we are the light of the world. The widespread use of electricity in our society today makes us less aware of the value and importance of light in our lives, so sometimes we just let Jesus' message about light go in one ear and out the other thinking, "not so important in this day and age." Lamps in the ancient world served a vital function. similarly to today. They enable us to see and work in the day and to avoid stumbling. My garage has a floodlight on it, but lately the sensor hasn't been reliable so I never really know when the light will turn on. When the light does its job I can move around easily and without fear of falling, crashing into things, etc. When the light fails, I find myself jittery, fumbling around in the dark with arms extended, and worried that I'll trip, fall, or injure myself somehow - the darkness in those moments is VERY DARK. We, Jesus' disciples, are called to be light: light-bearers of the light who is Jesus, each and every moment of every day! At the very last reconciliation class, the children were practicing a song called "This Little Light of Mine." While practicing, of course, the singing was kind of quiet and subdued. The catechists and I asked the children to think about WHY we'd be singing that song and if they thought their lights inside them - after having been forgiven by God would be weak or strong; they all yelled s-t-r-o-n-g lights! Well, we continued to challenge the children saying, if our lights are s-t-r-o-n-g, how should our singing about our lights being bright be? L-O-U-D was what they yelled!!! Their parents gathered in the PC all got to enjoy their spiritual enthusiasm while listening to their singing. As we all joined our voices in celebration at the conclusion of the First Reconciliation Service, I'll bet some nearby neighbors could hear the joy at letting our lights shine!
