LIFE (Learning In Faith Experiences – (Our Parish Faith Formation Program)

Some people love to read John's gospel because he uses a lot of words and is flowery,

while others prefer the more down-to-earth language of the other gospels. I, myself, quite enjoy John! This gospel takes place after the Last Supper and the Discourses (Jesus sharing with the disciples what lies ahead for him, and for them) and before his arrest. In this reading we are privy to Jesus' prayer to his Father. Jesus is praying for the entire Church of all of time - the Church that extends beyond the first disciples; and he is praying for the Unity of the Church, that it remain true to sharing in the same mission that was His through the Father. This Prayer for the Church, for each one of us, is so that the world can believe that the Father sent the Son. It is our responsibility to ensure that we, his present disciples, make Jesus known. Jesus also fervently prayed this because he would soon be removed from the disciples and was praying to His Father for divine protection. On another note: There's a word in this passage that stands out, and for some reason, has stood out to me in the numerous readings from Jesus' Discourses, and that word is truth. Yes, of course, I'm reminded of 2 famous lines about truth. The first, spoken by Pilate when he tests Jesus by asking "What is truth?". The next line is from A Few Good Men when Col. Jessep addresses the court stating: "You want truth? You can't handle the truth!" Surely, the concept of truth can lead to a very interesting conversation in any gathering and may be received with laughter, ridicule, or disrespect. The concept of truth, clearly, has fallen on hardtimes in our society. So, let's go back to square one: What is truth? I am "borrowing" this definition—I apologize, but I can't credit the author because I don't know where it's from: Truth is that which is consistent with the mind, will, character, glory and being of God. Even more to the point: Truth is the selfexpression of God. Because the definition of truth flows from God, truth is theological. Truth also is ontological (the way things really are). Reality is what it is because God declared it so and made it. Therefore God is the author, source, ultimate standard, and judge of all truth. Whenever we are faced with a moral decision, we must choose between a truth and an untruth (lie). To choose the way of truth is always simpler when we know Truth: the Way, Truth, and the Life (Jn. 14:6). I think that we can all agree that it is always much easier to live in the light of truth than to try to live amidst lies. If this statement resonates with you, why is it that the truth doesn't always prevail? Please, this week, take some time to enter into Jesus' prayer in this gospel and ask Him for that divine protection to know and live the truth, so to share in Jesus' mission.
