LIFE (Learning In Faith Experiences)

Have you ever come across a quote that resounds within you and you find that you keep returning to it and ruminating over it? On at

least three separate occasions, in a matter of a few days, I came across these gems (to me) that I would like to share and perhaps impose them upon your thoughts for this week ahead. The first is a quote of Mahatma Gandhi: "I like your Christ, but I do not like your Christians. Your Christians are so unlike your Christ." (I know this sounds strong and can seem offensive, but...just be with it...) My musings: Am I sometimes included in that "grouping" of Christians? What do my words and actions suggest to others who don't know me? How can I be more Christ-like each and every day? The second thought came about while listening to a Christian song entitled Leaving Eden that I heard on the radio the other day. The gist of the song had to do with all of the pain, struggles, and difficult circumstances (most made by humankind) that we face in our everyday world and how far we've come since the harmony and peace of the Garden of Eden. My thoughts: Why is it that we struggle so in living with God's gifts of beauty and love? Isn't it easier to live in love rather than live with hate? And lastly, I was scanning through radio stations while driving in to work and my eyes glanced down to the screen that showed the title of a song called Love Is a Verb. Unfortunately the song was ending so I didn't hear it. My reflections: It may not be necessary to have heard the words to this song, each one of us can write our own words describing love - or how love should be - a verb in our daily living. Take time to look at and name the gifts that God has given to you and the ways God works within your life, as well as all that God accomplishes in our world. Observe all of these things and then STOP to count these blessings! The most profound way that Jesus shares his love with us is in bread – the Eucharist that nourishes us in our journey of faith. The more we come to Jesus in the Eucharist, the more we recognize God's LOVE within our heart, family, community and world; then we can be and bring that bread to share with others.
